
SIM Grant:

Healthier Washington is bringing together providers, social service organizations, health plans, hospitals, county governments, tribes, and others through nine regional **Accountable Communities of Health (ACHs)**. ACHs will support communities in making informed decisions on health needs and priorities.

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
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A transformed system = transformed lives

Current System	Transformed System
Fragmented clinical and financial approaches to care delivery	Integrated systems that deliver whole person care
Disjointed care and transitions	Coordinated care and transitions
Disengaged clients	Activated clients
Capacity limits in critical service areas	Optimal access to appropriate services
Individuals impoverish themselves to access long term services and supports (LTSS)	Timely supports delay or divert need for Medicaid LTSS
Inconsistent measurement of delivery system performance	Standardized performance measurement with accountability for improved health outcomes
Volume-based payment	Value-based payment


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- ...and the enrollees and their needs are different.
- Before the Affordable Care Act, 60% of enrollees were children; now the majority of enrollees (55%) are adults.
 - 22% of the new adult enrollees have a mental health diagnosis.
 - 14% have a substance use disorder.
 - And, while the new adult group has lower hospital admission rates than other non-disabled adults, their inpatient stays average 50% longer.

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In addition, there will soon be many more people age 65 and over in our state...



...and their health care needs are likely to increase as they age.

- By 2035, the number of people age 75 or older will have risen by roughly 150%.
- Between 2010 and 2040, we anticipate a 181% increase in Medicaid clients over age 65 with Alzheimer's.
- 70% of people who reach the age of 65 are likely to need long term supports and services at some point in their lives.
- Biennial expenditures by the state for long term supports and services are currently \$3.4 billion—or 6 percent of all general fund spending.

What the Medicaid Transformation waiver does for us:

- Gives Medicaid the flexibility and expenditure authority to achieve our vision for a Healthier Washington.
- Allows us to test, scale, and spread new models of care.
- Supports providers in building capacity.
- Builds connections within communities that allow for the right care, at the right place, at the right time, with the right provider.

Medicaid Transformation Goals

- **Reduce avoidable use of intensive services**
- such as acute care hospitals, nursing homes, psychiatric hospitals, and traditional long-term services and supports.
- **Improve population health**
- with a focus on the most critical measures for Medicaid beneficiaries and local communities.*
- **Accelerate the transition to value-based purchasing**
- so providers are paid for higher quality and improved health outcomes.
- **Ensure that Medicaid cost growth is two percentage points lower than national trends.**


*Such as prevention and management of diabetes and cardiovascular disease, obesity, smoking, mental illness, and substance abuse.



Three Medicaid Transformation Initiatives

- Initiative 1:** Transformation through Accountable Communities of Health
- Initiative 2:** Targeted Long-Term Services and Supports for At-Risk Individuals
- Initiative 3:** Targeted Foundational Community Supports


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Transformation through Accountable Communities of Health

Initiative 1

The State will:

- Establish a menu of transformation projects that ACH members can choose for their communities.
- Monitor progress and distribute funds based on project performance.

ACHs will:

- Lead and oversee transformation projects.

ACH members, working collaboratively, will:

- Select from projects to apply for and pursue, based on each ACH’s regional priorities, from the State’s menu of projects.

Parameters for projects will be established by the State. Some statewide projects may be required.


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ACHs will coordinate regional transformation efforts.

Initiative 1

ACHs will:

- Organize ACH members and partners.
- Coordinate project applications.
- Contract to receive State funds.
- Distribute funds to partners carrying out transformation projects.
- Report on progress.
- Work with the State and partners to ensure sustainability.

ACH


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Contracts with ACHs will not affect the State's other managed care contracts.

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Targeted Long-Term Services and Supports

Initiative 2

Washington will tailor long-term services and supports benefits to meet the diverse needs of our aging population by:

- Providing two new benefit packages, one with a new eligibility category to ensure that individuals receive the services and supports they need to avoid or delay more intensive services
- Revising eligibility criteria for nursing home services so that people with the lowest needs do not qualify for these services.

Individuals currently served in nursing facilities will continue to be eligible for this level of care.


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Targeted Foundational Community Supports

Initiative 3

Washington will provide targeted supportive housing and supported employment to clients that meet criteria set by the State.

The criteria will target those individuals most likely to benefit from these services.

Clients will receive supportive services; Medicaid funds will not be used to provide housing or jobs.



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Supportive Housing

Initiative 3

- Targeted to individuals who meet specific risk criteria, such as individuals:
 - Who are homeless and have behavioral health conditions
 - Need long-term services and supports
 - Are exiting inpatient institutional settings
- Activities might include:
 - Individual Housing Transition Services
 - Individual Housing & Tenancy Sustaining Services



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Supported Employment

Initiative 3

- Targeted to Medicaid participants with serious and persistent mental illness or eligible for long-term services and supports, who:
 - Wish to become employed and
 - Need intensive ongoing support to get and keep a job.
- Jobs are anticipated to be at or above the minimum wage.


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Federal Requirements

- **Five-year demonstration project**
 - Project goals must be met within 5 years.
- **The State must not spend any more federal dollars than they would have spent without the project.**
- **Ongoing evaluation must be done**
 - to test and confirm how well the program, and its projects, achieve the intended benefits.
- **Transformation must be sustainable after the demonstration period ends**
 - the State and ACHs must develop sustainability plans for projects they take on.


